- 3. Update on new faculty lines and part time/temporary hires
  - a. K. Carroll provided an update on the Department's attempt to acquire three new lines. The Dean of Arts and Sciences has approved our request for the three new positions and the requests will now move up to the Chancellor's office for approval.
  - b. The process by which temporary/part-time hires are hired. The process is as follows:
    - i. A potential professor sends a resume to the director of the Department
    - ii. The Personnel Committee evaluates the candidate
    - iii. The Personnel Committee writes a letter to the director approving or not approving the applicant (generally the letter specifies the classes that the applicant is prepared to teach)
    - iv. When it is determined that there is specific departmental need, the Director starts the hiring process by requesting the hire from the Dean of Arts and Sciences and the Chancellor.

It was also announced that the Personnel Committee and the Director have decided to recommend the part-time hiring of Dr. Clarena Larrotta, a former MAEE graduate and a tenured, Associate Professor at the University of Texas at San Marcos.

**MOTION:** That we end the discussion on temporary hires and move on to the next item on the agenda. **Motion Passed.** 

- 4. **ELECTION:** Personnel Committee Elections were held for two, three-year terms (B. Morales and G. Griggs' terms expired). Jocelyn Géliga Vargas and Catherine Mazak were both elected to serve three-year terms. Thus, their terms will expire in the summer of 2016.
- 5. G. Griggs briefly described a new set of instruments used to evaluate professors for promotion and tenure. The instruments were created in the College of Business Administration and recently translated by the current Personnel Committee. The Personnel Committee is requesting that professors look over the documents and send them any feedback they have on the documents.
