I. General Information of the Department of Psychology

a. Mission and Vision of the department

Mission

To educate students committed to psychology from a biopsychosocial perspective. We aim to promote critical thinking, lifelong learning, and discipline-specific competencies, equipping them to identify and address psychosocial problems in Puerto Rican society. We prioritize sensitivity and respect for diversity, ethical behavior, and the integration of theory and practice through interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary approaches. We aspire to graduate individuals who positively impact their communities and enrich the discipline with their holistic approach.

Vision

To be a cutting-edge program in Puerto Rico and recognized throughout the Americas for excellence in the training of psychologists with a strong sense of justice, ethics, and equity in their professional practice, research, and the development of solutions to the psychosocial problems faced by today's society, from an interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary perspective.

b. Organizational Structure

The Department of Psychology is composed of two academic programs and a service unit for the university and external community:

- Bachelor of Arts Program with a concentration in General Psychology
- Doctoral Program in Philosophy with a concentration in School Psychology
- A service center for the university and external community known as the Center for Training, Research, and Services in School Psychology (CAISPE), which is expected to be inaugurated during the August to December 2025 semester.

During the 2024–2025 academic year, the department had a director, an associate director, two graduate program coordinator (one per semester), a coordinator for graduate program practicum and internships (during Spring semester), three directors for CAISPE (One during Fall semester and two during Spring semester), 11 tenured faculty members and 2 on probationary status, a student affairs officer, an Administrative Assistant III (from September 2024 to February 2025), and an Administrative Officer I. As of May 2025, we had 32 graduate students and 332 undergraduate students.

II. Report on Initiatives, Activities, and Achievements in Accordance with the Strategic Plan and International Activity

a. Executive Summary

During the 2024–2025 academic year, the Department of Psychology has taken steps to develop initiatives aligned with the institution's strategic plan. Among these initiatives are the evaluation of the graduate and undergraduate program curriculum, with the goal of maintaining a curriculum that supports the developmental needs of the student community while upholding the ethical and quality standards required by the psychology profession.

Undergraduate Program in General Psychology

During the 2024–2025 academic year, the department received a total of 123 undergraduate admission applications (123 as a first choice, 99 as a second choice, and 82 as a third choice). Of these, 93 students were admitted to the program, 73 accepted the admission offer, and 51 of them completed the enrollment process and began their studies in August 2024.

School Psychology Doctorate Program

The School Psychology Doctorate Program received 17 applications, and 13 students were admitted for the 2024–2025 academic year. Of those students, 10 completed the enrollment process.

In May 2025, we began the consultation process for American Psychological Association (APA) accreditation. We are confident that by May 2026, the first doctoral class will graduate, and we will be able to begin submitting the necessary documentation to initiate the APA accreditation process.

CAISPE

The Centro de Adiestramiento, Investigación y Servicios en Psicología Escolar (CAISPE; Center for Training, Research, and Services in School Psychology) is a unit of the Department of Psychology, in the College of Arts and Sciences, at the University of Puerto Rico in Mayagüez. It began operations in 2024 and arose from the need for a space for training, research, and the provision of psychological services to students and faculty of the Graduate Program in School Psychology. CAISPE allows students and faculty to integrate theory with practice, as well as provide a variety of psychological services to the community at large. Students of the Graduate Program in School Psychology at the University of Puerto Rico at Mayagüez Campus are responsible for providing psychological services to the community through their practicum at CAISPE. Faculty members, who are licensed to practice psychology in Puerto Rico, are responsible for their supervision and assume ethical and professional responsibility for each case the students see. CAISPE also will serve as a research center.

b. Objective 1: Institutionalize a culture of strategic planning and assessment

The Department of Psychology at the University of Puerto Rico at Mayagüez (RUM) is undergoing significant development at academic, research, and service levels. The creation of research laboratories provides an opportunity for both graduate and undergraduate students to gain comprehensive research experience in various areas of psychology. With a doctoral program in philosophy specializing in school psychology, it is imperative to strengthen research experiences. Our graduate students play an important role in mentoring undergraduate students, and together they conduct research under the supervision of the department's faculty.

The service provided by the department's administrative staff and faculty is personalized and of high quality.

The upcoming opening of CAISPE will offer opportunities for conducting research, providing school psychology services and training to the external community, and serving as a practical component for both graduate and undergraduate courses, among other services.

The goal of the Department of Psychology is to enhance the services it offers, improve its infrastructure, update curricula, expand academic and research development opportunities, and continue contributing to the well-being of the university community and Puerto Rico.

Objective 2: To lead higher education throughout Puerto Rico while guaranteeing the best education for our students

The doctoral program in School Psychology is the only doctoral program in that specialty in Puerto Rico. We plan to begin submitting the required documents to achieve accreditation from the American Psychological Association (APA), with the goal of being evaluated in approximately two years.

Curricular Reviews – The psychology department's programs have been designed to meet the quality standards required by the psychology profession. For this reason, both the undergraduate and graduate curriculum are constantly under review. Some of the initiatives undertaken include the following:

- a. Undergraduate Curriculum
- Three new elective psychology courses were approved: PSIC4108 Principles and Models of Psychotherapy, PSIC4060 Behavioral Interventions for Children and Adolescents, and PSIC4107 Introduction to Group Therapy.
- All master syllabi references were updated.

- Three minors were developed (to be presented to the Faculty of Arts and Sciences): one in General Psychology (for non-psychology majors), and two for psychology students, focusing on Clinical Psychology and School Psychology.
- Dr. Cristina Perea developed the course Introduction to Psychological Consulting and Collaboration, which was approved at the department level and is awaiting approval by the Faculty of Arts and Sciences.
- As a way to attract students from our department to the school psychology program, we began informing them about the opportunity to take up to 15 credits in graduate-level courses while still undergraduates. Academic Senate Certification 09-09, "Standards Governing Graduate Studies at UPRM," authorizes the use of up to 15 credits in 5000- or 6000-level courses taken during undergraduate studies to be applied toward graduate-level requirements. Based on this policy, the Graduate Program in School Psychology proposes a plan that offers advanced undergraduate students who meet the established requirements the opportunity to take core doctoral program courses as part of their bachelor's degree requirements. This approach not only optimizes students' time and resources but also allows them to gain experience with advanced content, thereby strengthening their preparation for graduate studies in school psychology. Additionally, this plan can serve as a key strategy for the early recruitment of highly qualified candidates into the program, extending to other campuses within the University of Puerto Rico system.

b. Graduate Curriculum

The graduate curriculum has been under continuous review in accordance with the requirements established by the APA, as we are preparing to apply for accreditation. Among the courses reviewed are the practicum courses, with an increase in the number of practicum hours as required by the APA and the Puerto Rico Board of Examiners of Psychologists. A change was submitted for the course *PRACTICUM IN SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGY I (PSIC7501)* – increasing the number of practicum hours from 250 to 300 and updating the course description to be more inclusive.

- Recognitions given to teaching staff for academic and/or professional achievements.
 - Dr. Cristina Perea was elected President of the Puerto Rico Association of School Psychologists.
 - Dr. Irmarie Cruz was elected Vice President of the Puerto Rico Association of School Psychologists.
 - The XXX Symposium on Research in the Social Sciences: The Contribution of the Undergraduate Student to Applied Social Research was dedicated to Dr. Cristina Perea (Associate Professor of the Department of Psychology) and Dr. Tania del Mar López (Professor of the Department of Social Sciences). This dedication honors their commitment to research training for undergraduate students and their support of the symposium.
 - The XXX Symposium on Research in the Social Sciences:
 The Contribution of the Undergraduate Student to Applied Social Research chose to honor Dr. Janet Bonilla by recognizing her commitment to

undergraduate research and especially her commitment and valuable contributions to the organization and realization of the Symposium over the years.

- Strengthening of facilities for academic use
 - The Dean of Arts and Sciences transferred the amount of 15 laptops to create a laboratory in ch404 and be able to offer research courses there. It is also expected that graduate and undergraduate students will be able to use the facilities to carry out their research.
 - CAISPE is being used as an area to offer the Graduate Practice courses.
 - The psychological tests are located in CAISPE and this facilitates the management of inventory and delivery of these.
 - The psychology department began offering its services from July 2025 in the Celis 104 building. The new facilities provide us with a more welcoming and private space to offer academic counseling; each administrative staff and daily student has their individual workspace.
 - Two classrooms were transferred to the psychology department to offer undergraduate and undergraduate courses Ch322 and Ch404.
 - The meeting room at Celis 103 is being used to offer graduate courses on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

i. Improvements to facilities

- New TVs were installed on Ch322 and Ch404.
- The Ch322 room was painted.

ii. Acquisition of specialized resources

 - d. Objective 3: To increase and diversify the Institution's sources of revenue

Initiatives to obtain funds

The Department continued the process of establishing CAISPE, a service clinic for children and adolescents from which students of the Doctoral Program in School Psychology, so they can perform internships of several graduate courses. Specifically, it is proposed to establish a clinic of psychological services aimed at the population of children and adolescents in the western region of Puerto Rico. Services would be offered in the following areas:

- 1. Evaluation (Administration of psycho-educational and psycho-neurological tests)
- 2. Intervention (Psychological therapy)
- 3. Training-education (Workshops, prevention and education seminars)
- 4. Program evaluation
- Own income and intended use.

The Department of Psychology offers RUMEX courses, which has made it possible to attract funding that has been used to support faculty as well as graduate and

undergraduate students in their research initiatives. In addition, these funds have been used for promotional purposes and to purchase essential items for the department.

Collaboration agreements

During this academic year, collaboration agreements have been established to create practicum and internship sites for our graduate students. These agreements include the Puerto Rico Department of Education, Centro Ponceño de Autismo, Reading School District in Pennsylvania, the Counseling and Psychological Services Department at UPRM, Creciendo Juntos 360 LLC, Fundación Mi Ángel Manuel LLC, and the Counseling Department at UPR Aguadilla.

e. Objective 4: To implement efficient and expedient competitive creative endeavors

Various projects were developed with the goal of optimizing administrative processes through automation, simplification, standardization, and documentation, as well as strengthening the competencies of non-teaching staff. The main aspects are detailed below:

- Undergraduate student academic evaluations are conducted using the Google Drive platform. Each time a student is evaluated or receives academic advising, their curriculum is updated, notes from the meeting are recorded, and recommendations are provided to help ensure a complete learning experience and timely graduation.
- A digital student file is maintained, which includes their curriculum evaluation, course equivalencies, tentative transfers (if applicable), special permits, and other relevant documents.
- Establishment and documentation of administrative procedures for CAISPE and the graduate program in School Psychology: Internal processes for both were standardized and documented, resulting in the creation of a student handbook, practicum and internship manual, documents for psychological evaluation and intervention services, protocols, and more.
- Rubrics for evaluating graduate program applicants were reviewed and updated. These include rubrics for evaluating the curriculum vitae, interview, letters of recommendation, and personal statement.
- Evaluation of administrative processes: Evaluation mechanisms were introduced, such as a survey for undergraduate students to assess their academic advising experience. The results indicated a highly satisfactory experience, with 100% of students expressing their intention to continue using the services.
- Improvement and recognition activities for administrative and support staff: Administrative staff have been supported in participating in activities that enhance their performance and maintain motivation in the workplace. Ms. Anita Martinez and Ms. Deyka Lopez received a gift from the department faculty in recognition of their effort and dedication. On June 11, 2025, a graduate program

achievement event was held to recognize the accomplishments of graduate students, faculty, and administrative staff. Dr. Douglas Santos and Dr. Bernadette Delgado were awarded plaques for their contributions during the first five years of the graduate program and their persistence in developing and securing approval for the doctoral program. On December 9, 2024, a Christmas luncheon was held to foster camaraderie and recognize the work of the department faculty.

- Financial support has been provided to faculty and graduate students to
 present their research findings at professional forums. This has been made
 possible through funds obtained from courses offered under the RUMEX
 initiative.
- A rubric was developed to select the undergraduate student who will annually receive the Hilda Bacó Award. In accordance with the *Proposal of Criteria for Granting the Hilda Bacó Pagán Award*, the committee created a summary table for applying the rubric to each candidate. The rubric considers:
 - Overall GPA
 - GPA in the major
 - Participation in student and professional organizations
 - Academic honors/awards
 - Research participation and dissemination
 - Involvement in community impact initiatives or projects
 - Collaboration in departmental or institutional activities and initiatives (intraor extramural)

TRIN Lab:
