#### **Narrative**

The Business & Economic Development Center (BEDC), a University Center at the University of Puerto Rico, Mayagüez campus, as part of the Caribbean Regional UC, completed all the tasks in our scope of work during the 2024-2025 period: job creation (36), job retention (168), and its investment (\$624,050.00) and the UVI-CELL at University of Virgin Island (UVI) with job creation (25), job retention (60) and its investment (\$94,862.50). The Caribbean Regional UC proposes to provide specific activities through the BEDC at UPRM, and the UVI-CELL, which includes, providing technical assistance, conducting applied research and dissemination as part of the economic development activities. Three mayor categories of innovation activities proposed are: 1) technical assistance to innovators and existing businesses; 2) applied research through allied centers and courses, and 3) dissemination of all activities that impact economic development in the region. Regarding the direct service to clients the BEDC during this period received 67 service requests for a total of 160 in the year. We provided more than 119 hours of one-on-one assistance. In this period, a group of 22 intern students, with 12 graduate students among them, offered technical assistance in their different areas of specialization to businesses, under the supervision of our mentor's professors and business specialists according to the programs that are assigned. The BEDC continues as the hub of the UPRM E-Ship **Network**. As an ecosystem builder we support all the efforts to expand the entrepreneurial ecosystem in the region. Our more closed partners are the NSF I-Corps Site UPRM, Echar Pa'Lante of Banco Popular, Engine 4, West Chamber of Commerce, RISE Program of the Bravo Family Foundation (an acelerator), Parallel 18, and Colmena 66 of the Puerto Rico Science, Technology and Research Trust (PRTRUST), United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO), and the Patent and Trademark Resource Center at UPRM. Additionally, the incubator and accelerator Area-E completed their proposal, impacting more than 317 existing businesses in the five years they operated. Also, the Post Award Grants Management Technical Assistance Program (PAGM-TAB) finished its first cohort in June 2025, where they helped ten (10) municipalities and organizations in areas like general grants management, strenghtning of admnistrative processes, among others. Finally, our Seed Fund program expanded its services by creating the Mind Market NeuroLab, a space dedicated to help existing companies with 3.5 years or more of operation with their marketing strategies from a neuromarketing point of view and giving them the oportunity of presenting their proyects in their Demo Day and winning up to \$5,000.

#### Beyond these completed tasks and assignments, we would like to highlight the following:

• The magazine <u>UPRM E-ship Network La Revista</u>, developed by a group of students, is currently in its **seventeenth volume**. The main subject during this last volume was to continue celebrating the journey towards the fortieth (40) anniversary of the BEDC, highlighting advice, success stories, lessons learned and the evolution of initiatives that have left their mark.



As part of the US Caribbean Regional Proposal for Innovation & Business Development the University of Virgin Island-CELL reported:

- Successfully recruited **30 businesses** throughout the USVI and GCSEN courses with the intentions of providing entrepreneurship, workforce development. These businesses consisted of **10 ideas**, **5 startups**, and **10 existing businesses**.
- Offered 6 Zoom workshops for coaches, mentors, and other people that worked with the program in topics like branding, marketing, business plans, pitchdecks, business taxes, and licencing, in colaboration with the Global Center for Social Entrepreneurship Network.
- During this period, the program offered several courses and workshops, such as Certified Bookkeeper, Electric Vehicle Fundamentals, Certified Residential Real Estate Appraiser - Exam Prep, Child Development Associate, Professional Grant Writing, Certified Public Manager Program, among others. These activities are estimated to have impacted over 400 people.

All activities conducted to date have benefited our distressed and underserved community. All participating businesses are low income and minority-owned who have been traditionally underserved.

The platform was created by Prof. Ramón Álvarez, a professor of the Kinesioploy Departmento of the University of Puerto Rico at Mayagüez, and his students through several semester projects. The goal of the platform is to serve as a pilot for over a thousand students to find opportunitues of growth, create their network, and discover scholarship opportunities.

### Challenges and Mitigation

The BEDC received with great pleasure the acceptance of this new proposal, turning our project into a great legacy for **39 years** of relationship with EDA. Among the challenges, the billing processes have always been an issue, but we have managed to minimize delays and are currently up to date. Among other challenges for UPRM and UVI is the need for cash matching funds from the administration to cover the costs that the proposal has reduced.



The BEDC continue as a hub of the *UPRM E-ship Network* serving as a role models to the other campuses and organizations in the process of strengthening and developing their I&E Ecosystem. During the year we supported several allied programs such as the Engine 4, CFP of the "Resarch Grants Program", SBIR Comitte and "Phase I" of the PRSTRUST, I-Corps RUM, Grupo Guayacán, P18, Venturewell, Puerto Rico Manufacturing Extension, United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO), among others. We still collaborate with projects related to CDBG-DR grants, such as CRECEN. We continue leveraging our impact on Puerto Rico's west side, through collaboration with programs such as the West Chamber of Commerce, Mercado Colegial, CITAI, Patent and Trademark Resource Center UPRM, ACS Org, PRASBE, among others. In the case of UVI-CELL they work closely with the GCSEN, St.Thomas Chamber of Commerce, the UVI Research and TechnologyPark, UVI School of Business Department, SCORE Fort Lauderdael, and the Small Business Administration (SBA).




Figure 2: https://sellingpartners.aboutamazon.com/husband-and-wife-entrepreneurs-bring-a-puerto-rican-superfood-to-american-tables-with-amazon
