

Funding Terminology

- What is a Grant?
 - "A sum of money given by an organization, especially a government, for a particular purpose."
 - As per grants.gov: When the US Fed Gov transfers funds to a non-federal entity to carry out a public purpose
 - Could be research, education, public programs, training, etc.
- What is a Contract?
 - When the Fed Gov acquires goods or services from a non-federal entity
- What is a Cooperative Agreement?
 - Very similar to a Grant agreement, however the Fed Gov will have more collaborative authority in how the project is carried out.

Grants Vs Contracts

- Scope of Work defined by recipient

Contracts

- Scope of Work defined by fed agency
- Directly benefits the fed agency in fulfilling its public duties
- Results are delivered to the fed agency



CFDA Basics

- Funding from the US Federal Government is called "Federal Assistance"
- When the funding is to a US-based entity, it is termed "Domestic" (vs. "Foreign")
- Once a funding opportunity is approved, it is assigned an identification number and becomes part of a catalog of opportunities published by the federal government
- CFDA: <u>Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance</u>
- CFDA is a 5 digit number assigned in the awarding document to most Grants and Cooperative Agreements funded by the Federal government

CFDA continued

- The CFDA is now called "Assistance Listings" and can be found at beta.SAM.gov
- The Assistance Listings help users find general information about the assistance, identify program objectives, eligibility requirements
- Caveat: It contains retired opportunities, so the listing may not be currently active
- More detailed information, as well as currently active listings can be found on Grants.gov (more on that later...)
- Why CFDA vs. Grants.gov? It was a predecessor to grants.gov for funding searches until 2002, when grants.gov was released







Federal Assistance


- DISCRETIONARY: Entity seeking funding applies by submitting a grant proposal to the Federal Agency, responding to a nationally competitive call for proposals, called a "Notice of Funding Availability," or NOFA
- **FORMULA**: Funds are distributed to a State or Local Public Agency branch of the Federal Agency, who publishes the competitive opportunity locally. Applicant applies through local agency. Example: State Housing Authority, Health Department, or Department of Education.

Formula Funds and "Block Grants"


- Formula Grants: Non-competitive awards to state, local or territory governments based on a formula (generally demographics, different for each program)
- Block Grants: Federal assistance to state or territory governments for broad community or social service goals, to be used at the discretion of the local government
- Examples:
 - HUD Community Development Block Grants (CDBG-DR)
 - COR3 (FEMA funds through local government)



I Found Several Interesting Opportunities... How Do I Select the Right One?

- Keep in mind that federal agencies fund groups or organizations, rarely individuals
- It is important to define the mission and vision of your organization, your needs, and your goals in applying for funding (what you hope to achieve) before you decide on a specific opportunity.
- Each federal agency has its own mission and vision, and will have specific goals that it will want to achieve with this funding opportunity
- It is important that your organization's Mission and Goals are in alignment with that of the funding agency and the specific funding opportunity—it will be important to describe this in your narrative

Determining whether the sponsor's mission is a fit for you:

- Get to know the sponsor/funding agency—
 - Read sponsor web pages, mission statement, history and scope of grant making activity
 - Talk with other funded organizations; with the program officers
 - Read and re-read the Program Announcement
 - Look at goals of program, funding priorities, target populations and review criteria
 - Weigh those against your own goals, expertise, collaborative relationships, and your organization's capacity and infrastructure

Determine whether **your goals** are a good match for **their needs**—what is in it for the sponsor?

- Research what else the agency has funded:
 - Review abstracts or samples of successful proposals if available
 - What kinds of organizations were funded? What similarities do you share with them?
- Make sure that you can justify a clear connection between your objectives and those of the sponsor
 - Example: If you are applying to the EDA, how will the outcomes of your project ultimately impact economic recovery for Puerto Rico, whether as a direct or indirect consequence
- Remember that a proposal is a persuasive argument for the agency to give you money for your project, and that they will benefit by advancing their public mission. They are your audience and you need to speak to their published needs.

Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery Action Plan






Figure 7.Summary of public hearing outcomes as of 5/2/18. (Subject to change as proposals are amended. Total includes 4 uncategorized projects)

PROJECT LENGTH

Period of Performance: Under the EAA program, the project period of performance depends on the nature of the project for which the grant is awarded. Typically, disaster and economic recovery strategy grants may range in duration from 12 to 18 months with extensions considered on a case-by-case basis. Implementation grants involving construction of project facilities and infrastructure generally are expected to range from 12 to 24 months. EDA will work closely with the recipients to accommodate their projected timelines within reason and allowances of regulations and grant policies. - b. The applicant's eligibility to receive an EDA grant, as described in Section C.1;
- c. Whether the proposed project is located in or serves an area that has received a major disaster designation as a result of Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, or Maria, or wildfires or other natural disasters occurring in calendar year 2017 under the Stafford Act, as described in Section C.2;
- d. Whether the project is consistent with the goals of EAA as detailed in Section A.1, including whether the proposal demonstrates a nexus between the proposed project scope of work and disaster recovery and resilience efforts; and
- e. Except with respect to proposals for strategy grants, the project's alignment with the applicable region's economic objectives stated in the region's CEDS (or CEDS equivalent), as described in Section A.1.¹⁶
