COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Fundamental concepts, knowledge and skills necessary for the practice of nursing in any clinical area.

COURSE OUTCOMES:

- a. Explains how knowledge and skills from nursing sciences and other disciplines (General System Theory, Nursing Theories, High Level Wellness and others) provide guide to the practice of nursing
- b. Describe nursing as a system interacting with other systems to promote and maintain health, prevent illness, restore high level of wellness or care for the client system at the end of life.
- c. Envelop the importance of professional nursing roles and functions in the practice of nursing
- d. Use skills of inquiry, analysis and research literacy to address individualize care and practice issues
- e. Apply the nursing process to fulfill the basic needs of the client system along the health illness continuum, promoting, and maintaining health, preventing and managing illnesses, promoting rehabilitation and providing end of life care.
- f. Employ interpersonal relationship knowledge and skills in the implementation of the nursing process while providing care to the client system
- g. Integrate values, legal, ethical principles in the ministering of care to the client system
